

The Episcopal Word

On this Founder's Day, we joyfully celebrate the enduring legacy of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, an ecclesial institution that has been a pillar of faith, justice, and liberation since 1816. Today, we honor the vision and courage of Richard Allen, Sarah Allen, Daniel Payne, Morris Brown, Henry McNeil Turner, Jarena Lee and countless others whose unflappable conviction and unwavering dedication laid the foundation for a denomination rooted in God's Word, committed to spiritual guidance, a proponent for social justice and equality for those who have been marginalized by the vehicle known as oppression. Our rich legacy bequeathed to each of us by a throng of clergy and supportive laity calls for the body of Christ to strive to be more like Jesus as we do His work in a more excellent way.

The observance of Founder's Day for the members of the Ninth Episcopal District compels each of us to thank God for His proverbial hand of protection from the very beginning of our existence to this present moment. Yes, we can blend our voices together and proclaim with great fervency, "We Have Come This Far by Faith!"

This year marks the 60th anniversary of the Voting Rights Act which gave us the right to vote; 60 years after the Civil Rights Act, our activism continues. This is the 60th anniversary of the MARCH from Selma to Montgomery. We remember the early attempt at this march led by Congressman John Lewis and Reverend Hosea Williams as many freedom fighters left the sanctuary of Brown Chapel AME Church and were met with fierce opposition on the Edmund Pettus Bridge on what would be known as Bloody Sunday. Eventually, under the leadership of the Reverend Dr. Martin Luther King, Jr., the march from Selma to Montgomery did happen, fighting the power of injustice. Despite making a few gains, we still experienced blatant prejudice in our lives as we protested Jim Crow laws. It was courageous men and women who participated in sit-ins at lunch counters, refused to ride on the back of the bus, and participated in peaceful demonstrations of unconstitutional segregated interstate transportation facilities. Beloved, 60 years after our march for freedom, our activism continues. Let us never forget those who went before us to pave a brighter tomorrow for each and every one of us as our activism continues for the next generation.

It is with much delight, we welcome to the Ninth Episcopal District pulpit Bishop Gregory G.M. Ingram, the 118th elected and consecrated Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. His words of encouragement through the preached word will empower each of us to strive to serve God with a spirit of excellence. His commitment to stewardship and evangelism as a pastor has been well chronicled as he served as the pastor of Oak Grove AME Church in Detroit, Michigan prior to becoming one of the Reverend Fathers in God. Additionally, our newly elected general officer, the Reverend Dr. Mark K. Tyler, the Historiographer for our denomination will be our principal symposium lecturer. Prior to his election, Dr. Kelly served as the popular pastor of Mother Bethel AME Church in Philadelphia, Pennsylvania. Supervisor McAllister joins me in prayer for our time at Saint John-Birmingham as we assemble as an episcopal district to celebrate our storied past and step boldly into our future.

The African Methodist Episcopal Church grew out of the Free African Society (FAS) which **Richard Allen**, Absalom Jones, and others established in Philadelphia in 1787. When officials at St. George's Methodist Episcopal Church pulled blacks off their knees while praying, FAS members discovered just how far American Methodists would go to enforce racial discrimination against African Americans. Hence, these members of St. George's made plans to transform their mutual aid society into an African congregation. Although most wanted to affiliate with the Protestant Episcopal Church,

Bethel AME was dedicated with Allen as pastor. To establish Bethel's independence from interfering white Methodists, Allen, a former Delaware slave, successfully sued in the Pennsylvania courts in 1807 and 1815 for the right of his congregation to exist as an independent institution. Because black Methodists in other middle Atlantic communities encountered racism and desired religious autonomy, Allen called them to meet in Philadelphia to form a new Wesleyan denomination, the AME Church.





The geographical spread of the AMEC prior to the Civil War was mainly restricted to the Northeast and Midwest. Major congregations were established in Philadelphia, New York, Boston, Pittsburgh, Baltimore, Washington, DC, Cincinnati, Chicago, Detroit, and other large Blacksmith's Shop cities. Numerous northern communities also gained a substantial AME presence. Remarkably, the slave states of Maryland,

Kentucky, Missouri, Louisiana, and, for a few years, South Carolina, became additional locations for AME congregations. The denomination reached the Pacific Coast in the early 1850s with churches in Mother Bethel Church Stockton, Sacramento, San Francisco, and other places in California. Moreover, Bishop Morris Brown established the Canada Annual Conference.

Allen led a small group who resolved to remain Methodists. In 1794

The most significant era of denominational development occurred during the Civil War and Reconstruction. Oftentimes, with the permission of Union army officials AME clergy moved into the states of the collapsing Confederacy to pull newly freed slaves into their denomination. "I Seek My Brethren," the title of an often-repeated sermon that Theophilus G. Steward preached in South Carolina, became a clarion call to evangelize fellow blacks in Georgia, Florida, Alabama, Texas, and many other parts of the south. Hence, in 1880 AME membership reached 400,000 because of its rapid spread below the Mason-Dixon line.

When Bishop Henry M. Turner pushed African Methodism across the Atlantic into Liberia and Sierra Leone in 1891 and into South Africa in 1896, the AME now laid claim to adherents on two continents.

While the AME Church is doctrinally Methodist, clergy, scholars, and lay persons have written important works which demonstrate the distinctive theology and praxis which have defined this Wesleyan body. Bishop Benjamin W. Arnett, in an address to the 1893 World's Parliament of Religions, reminded the audience of the presence of blacks in the formation of Christianity. Bishop Benjamin T. Tanner wrote in 1895 in The Color of Solomon – What? that biblical scholars wrongly portrayed the son of David as a white man. In the post-civil rights era theologians James H. Cone, Cecil W. Cone, and Jacqueline Grant who came out of the AME tradition critiqued Euro-centric Christianity and African American churches for their shortcomings in fully impacting the plight of those oppressed by racism, sexism, and economic disadvantage.

In the 1990s, the AME Church included over 2,000,000 members, 8000 ministers, and 7000 congregations in nearly 40 nations in North and South America, Africa, Europe, and now Asia. Twenty bishops and 12 general officers comprise the leadership of the denomination.



Bishop Gregory Gerald McKinley Ingram Retired Bishop, African Methodist Episcopal Church

GREGORY GERALD MCKINLEY INGRAM, a native of Detroit, Michigan, was elected and consecrated the 118th Bishop of the African Methodist Episcopal Church in 2000. His first appointment as a Bishop was to the Fifteenth Episcopal District; in 2004 his second assignment was to the Tenth Episcopal District, and July 4, 2012, during the 49th Quadrennial

Session of the General Conference in Nashville, Tenn., he was assigned to the First Episcopal District. Upon his retirement in July 2021, he accepted the invitation to serve as Professor of Leadership and Director of Mapping the Future of Black Methodism Future Initiative for Payne Theological Seminary.

Committed to the vision he advanced as an aspirant for the Episcopal service, Bishop Ingram was passionate and intentional in advancing his holistic multi-dimensional approach to effective ministry he conceptualized in 1998 and in the three Episcopal Districts he served. His initial 7-Point Partnership Plan evolved into a 10-Point Partnership Plan that included modules on "Health and Human Services," "Stewardship," "Church Growth and Evangelism," Political Empowerment," and "Management, Marketing & Administration." Later, the 10-Point Partnership Plan was augmented into 10 Guideposts strategies for improving every aspect of life for the people of the AME Church.

Prior to his election to the Episcopacy, Bishop Ingram served as the Senior Minister of Oak Grove African Methodist Episcopal Church in Detroit, Michigan. During his 12-and-a-half-year/nearly 13-year pastorate, the church prospered both numerically and financially. Under his visionary leadership and spiritual direction, 2,600 people united in membership, and more than 1,420 were inspired to become tithers. While pastor of Oak Grove, Bishop Ingram liquidated all church debts, including paying off in five years all costs related to a multi-million-dollar building and expansion project, the purchasing of four commercial properties four weeks before leaving Oak Grove and earlier purchased a transitioning (Samaritan) house for men. Upon his election as a bishop, he left in the church treasury more than \$1.2 million dollars. Before being assigned to Oak Grove, Bishop Ingram served as pastor of AME churches in Chicago, Springfield and Alton, Illinois. He also served two years on the religious staff at Southern Illinois University-Edwardsville Campus.


Bishop Ingram distinguished himself throughout African Methodism, in particular, and the religious community in general, a gift and expertise on stewardship and tithing. A visionary, dynamic preacher, lecturer and writer, Bishop Ingram has authored a number of publications in the Church. Included among them are *The S.A.T. Manual on African Methodism: A Study Guide on the Faith, Beliefs, History and Structure of the World's Oldest Denomination Founded by Blacks, Equipping the Saints for Service, The Joy of Giving More Than Enough- a book on stewardship, The African Methodist Episcopal Church Pastor's Journal and Quarterly Conference Record Book, and edited two books of sermons, Go Preach My Gospel and Ain't That Good News?*

Bishop Ingram was privileged to chair the General Conference Commission for the 49th Quadrennial Session, honored to serve as chairman of the Bicentennial Committee, and served as the host bishop for the historic 50th Quadrennial Session of the General Conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church, which was held in Philadelphia, PA, the birthplace of the denomination. As chairman of the Bicentennial Celebration, Bishop Ingram was the complier and editor-in-chief for two significant publications: a 365-day devotional, entitled *Moments of Meditation: Celebrating the Bicentennial of the*

African Methodist Episcopal Church, and The Encyclopedia of African Methodism: Bicentennial Edition. Additionally, Bishop Ingram was the visionary behind the Richard Allen Statue and Memorial Courtyard at Mother Bethel AME Church, as well as the 25-by-45-foot mural of Bishop Richard Allen that graces the exterior of First District Plaza at 38th and Market streets in Philadelphia, where the First Episcopal District is headquartered.

Bishop Ingram holds a Bachelor of Arts degree from Wilberforce University, a Master of Arts degree in Teaching from Antioch College, a Master of Divinity degree from Garrett Evangelical Theological Seminary and a Doctor of Ministry degree from United Theological Seminary. His religious, civic, community, professional and social affiliations, past and present, are many. Bishop Ingram has been privileged to serve as chairman of the Board of Trustees of The African Methodist Episcopal Church, Inc., as well as board chair of Payne Theological Seminary and Paul Quinn College. He is a life member of the National Association for the Advancement of Colored People (NAACP), Kappa Alpha Psi Fraternity, Inc; and is a Thirty-Third Degree Mason-Prince Hall Affiliation.

Bishop Ingram is married to Rev. Dr. Jessica Kendall Ingram, the proud parent of one daughter Jennifer Eman' Keanne and grandparent of two treasured granddaughters, Jayda Eman' and Gabrielle.



The Reverend Mark Kelly Tyler, Ph.D. Executive Director, Department of Research and Scholarship/Historiographer

In August 2024, Reverend Mark Kelly Tyler, Ph.D. was elected as the Executive Director, Department of Research and Scholarship/ Historiographer of the African Methodist Episcopal Church at the 52nd Quadrennial Session of the General Conference in Columbus, Ohio.

Mark Kelly Tyler is a native of Oakland, CA, the third child of Bill and Elroy Tyler. He accepted God's call to preach the Gospel of Christ in 1987. He is an Itinerant Elder in the African Methodist Episcopal Church.

He is a graduate of Clark Atlanta University (B.A., Religion), Payne Theological Seminary (Master of Divinity), and the University of Dayton (Ph.D., Educational Leadership). In 1994, Dr. Tyler began serving full time in pastoral ministry in the AME Church. He served as a pastor of congregations from coast to coast: Oakley Chapel (Tebbetts, Missouri); Quinn Chapel (Jefferson City, Missouri); Allen Chapel (San Francisco, California); Prince Chapel by the Sea (La Jolla, California); Bethel (Oxford, Ohio); Bethel (West Chester, Pennsylvania); and Macedonia (Camden, New Jersey).

Dr. Tyler served with distinction as the 52nd pastor of Mother Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Philadelphia. Mother Bethel, founded by Bishop Richard Allen, has been a spiritual, social, and community force since the late 1700s. Mother Bethel is also the site of the final resting place of church founder, Bishop Allen. It is an international destination for pilgrims and tourists alike. Dr. Tyler's love for ministry, combined with his passion for history, led to many exciting initiatives and programs at Mother Bethel.

Dr. Tyler led the drive to secure funding for *Bishop Richard Allen: Apostle of Freedom (The Documentary)*, serving as Executive Producer and Writer on the project. He also served as the Producer and Writer for the Council of Bishops' production of *The Anvil: Echoes from the General Conference* which made its debut at the 2012 General Conference of the African Methodist Episcopal Church. Most recently, Dr. Tyler was interviewed by Dr. Henry Louis "Skip" Gates in the PBS documentary, *The African Americans: Many Rivers to Cross*. Additionally, Dr. Tyler has appeared in various other documentaries, including multiple episodes of *Philadelphia: The Great Experiment; The Scroll: Evidence of the Life Unseen*, Volume 2; the PBS series, *A Taste of History; Philly Firsts*; and *Coltrane's Philadelphia*.

Dr. Tyler has also been active in the world of theological education, currently serving as a Fully Affiliated Faculty Member at the Methodist Theological Seminary in Ohio. He is a member of the Adjunct Faculty at Payne Theological Seminary (PTS) and a past Adjunct Professor at New Brunswick Theological Seminary (NBTS).

Dr. Tyler is the past Director of Church Relations and Alumni Affairs at PTS and the past Director of Church Vocations at NBTS. He serves on the Advisory Board for the Urban Theological Institute at Lutheran Theological Seminary at Philadelphia and served on the Advisory Board for Northeastern Seminary at Roberts Wesleyan College in Rochester, New York.

Dr. Tyler is a member of Alpha Phi Alpha Fraternity, Inc. and in his "spare time" enjoys traveling to new places, riding his mountain bike, and roller skating. He and his wife, Leslie, live in the Philadelphia area. He has four wonderful children.
