



#### **Biography**

Charlie Nichols, a native of Pensacola, Florida, grew up as the fifth of eight children in the family of Rev. Charlie E. and Agnes Nichols. As a preacher's son, his childhood was shaped by faith, family, and a deep commitment to community. In the early 1960s, Charlie and his sister, Juanita, made history as the first African Americans to integrate A.V. Clubbs Junior High School, placing him at the heart of the civil rights movement during a pivotal moment in history.

Charlie is married to Dr. Joyce C. Nichols, retired Associate Professor in the Department of Research and Advanced Studies at the University of West Florida. Together, they are the proud parents of six children.

A devoted member of Bethel African Methodist Episcopal Church in Pensacola and Mobile while a student at the University of South Alabama. Charlie has served the congregation and the church at large in numerous leadership roles: Steward, usher, choir member, Director of Lay Activities (local and conference levels), Parliamentarian (Episcopal level), former District Lay President, President of the Eleventh Episcopal District Lay Organization, and currently as Chaplain of the Connectional Lay Organization.
